Sharing Our Blessings and **Preparing a Meal**


Women's Fellowship has decided to assist Spirit of Hope by preparing several meals for the men's shelter in Delavan. Spirit of Hope runs the shelter, which is located at Delavan United Methodist Church on South Second Street. They have asked area service organizations to help out by providing meals during their dates of operation (November 3, 2024 through April 24, 2025).

Our church has signed up to provide a meal on Saturday, December 14; Tuesday, January 14; and Wednesday, February 12. Teams will be needed to work together to donate prepared food that will be dropped off at the church on our assigned nights. In addition to the dinner meal and two gallons of milk, they

are asking for other food items (lunchmeats, cheeses, juice, etc.) to cover other meals the following day. The shelter houses up to ten men at any given time, but we will be calling prior to each meal to determine how many to prepare for.

Please watch for the sign up sheet on the table in the back of the sanctuary. We have been blessed with the necessities of food and home—time to share our blessings with those who may be struggling at this moment. Thank you for your willingness to help out in this project!


Two Advent Calendar Options

And remember that our church is a great place to watch the Christmas parade from, after we sell out from the cookie sale!



"BENEATH THE FLAMES is an intimate combination of love, race, and life as an urban firefighter.

A fire in a neighboring farmhouse has young farmer and volunteer firefighter, Mitch Garner, blaming himself for the tragic outcome. He loses all hope of forgiving himself. His only hope for redemption is to leave Jennie, the girl he's loved since high school, and journey from Wisconsin's lush farmland to the decaying inner city of Milwaukee to prove himself as a professional firefighter.

Mitch is assigned to the busiest firehouse in the heart of one of the most blighted areas of Milwaukee, the Core, where he's viciously hazed by senior firefighters. He struggles to hold it together at horrific scenes of violence and can't do anything right at fires. Within weeks, he's ready to give up and quit. His salvation comes in the form of a brash adolescent girl, Jasmine Richardson. Mitch is assigned to tutor her little sister through a department

mentoring program. Despite Jasmine's contempt toward Mitch, her courage and devotion to her little sister inspire Mitch to stay and dedicate himself to helping her and the neighboring children overcome the hopelessness of growing up in crushing poverty.

Trouble on the farm has Mitch torn between returning home to Jennie and staying in Milwaukee where he'll be forced to risk his life to protect Jasmine from the leader of the One-Niner street gang. "

Church Council Meeting Minutes
Via Zoom
November 19th, 2024 at 7:00 P.M.

The meeting was called to order at 7:06 p.m. by Moderator Bobbi Rader. Those present were Barb Townsend, Cindy Waller, Tina Kruger, Patti Phillips, Tom Stepp and Dorothy Bever.

The Opening Prayer was given by Barb Townsend.

Additions to the agenda: Cindy Waller asked that Christmas Eve be discussed under New Business.

Approval of October 15, 2024 Council Minutes: Patti Phillips moved to approve the minutes from the October 15th, 2024 Council meeting as presented. Seconded by Bobbi Rader. The motion to approve the minutes was carried unanimously.

Treasurer's Report: Tina Kruger stated that other than the rent income change, the budget to date is pretty much the same as last month. Following slight discussion, Barb Townsend moved to approve the treasurer's report as submitted, seconded by Patti Phillips. The motion was carried unanimously.

Pastor's (Office) Moment: Cindy Waller stated that she has organized the scheduling for our local Salvation Army bell ringing season at Hansen's IGA. Our UCC church is scheduled to ring the bells November 27th from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm and again on December 24th from 9:00 am until 3:00 pm.

Ministry Leaders' Reports/Updates: Reports were submitted from Faith Formation, Stewardship and Missions, Women's Fellowship and Congregational Care.

Old Business: Search Committee/Update: Barb Townsend stated the committee will be reviewing a submitted profile.

Pulpit/Bridge Pastor - Fill in, November 17: Cindy Waller stated that the guest Pastor from Sunday did a great job and will keep her in mind for the future.

Memorial Funds: Barb Townsend reported that the painting in the Geneva Street entry was completed and looks great. This was covered by the Ann Serpe memorial fund.

Church Insurance - Audit/Refund: Tina Kruger reported on the status. Tom Stepp added that he is continuing to work out the details with Acuity Insurance.

Stewardship: Ray Knutson submitted a report in his absence.

Hurricane Help-Monetary: Cindy Waller reported that \$1034.35 was collected.

Finance Team/Budget: Tina Kruger presented the proposed 2025 budget for review. Following discussion of the proposed budget, Tina stated that she would put together a proposed package for a budget that would include our finances now with Pastor Kathleen. A proposed budget that would include a budget with a part time pastor and a third that would include a budget with a full time pastor.

Also discussed was the increase in the music budget from \$9200 to \$9600 and pulpit supply to be increased to \$175. With this, Bobbi Rader moved to adjust pulpit supply subs from \$150 to \$175. Seconded by Tom Stepp. The motion was carried unanimously.

Bobbi Rader then made a motion that the three proposed budgets be available for the December 1st Annual meeting; 1) pulpit supply only, 2) part time funds for a part time pastor and 3) full time funds for a full time pastor. Barb Townsend seconded the motion. The motion was carried unanimously. Tina will submit the 3 proposed budgets to be presented and voted on at the Annual meeting.

Annual Reports: Cindy stated that she is still waiting for a few more annual reports and thanked those Teams who have submitted them already.

Nominating Team: Bobbi Rader stated that we are still looking for a Moderator, and Vice Moderator.

New Business: Lift Ceiling Repair: Barb Townsend stated that the lift ceiling was water damaged and needs to be drywalled. Tom Stepp stated that he would follow up on the repairs.

Constitution Updates/Annual meeting Agenda: Barb Townsend presented 3 constitution changes to be shared at the upcoming annual meeting. The first change was actually approved at the annual meeting in 2023 but the constitution wording was overlooked. It allowed for Stewardship of Resources to be split into two positions: Stewardship of Financial Resources and Building/Grounds. The second change allows the office manager to sit in on council in lieu of a pastor when we are without one as we are now. This will help us to be connected, but also assist us in reaching the needed quorum for meetings. The third change concerns the frequency with which financial statements are automatically sent out to our members. Following discussion, Barb Townsend moved to approve these three changes to the constitution. Seconded by Bobbi Rader. The motion was carried unanimously.

Regarding the annual meeting agenda, the 3 budget proposals will be added and the changes to the constitution will be added. Also note that on behalf of council, Bobbi Rader and Dorothy Bever will host coffee fellowship on December 1st.

Other: Christmas Eve Service: Cindy Waller stated that there will be one Christmas Eve service to be held at 5:00 p.m. with James Letellier providing the music.

Closing Prayer: Bobbi Rader gave the closing prayer.

Adjournment: Barb Townsend moved to adjourn, seconded by Tom Stepp. The meeting was adjourned at 8:06 p.m.

The next Council meeting of the Church Council will be December 17, 2024 at 7:00 p.m.



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Be Thankful AND Healthier!

November—often a time of year when we put more of an effort into thinking about the many things for which we are thankful. In other words, you can't have "thanks" without a few "thinks". The two words are very closely related because thinking about these things leads us to thanking God for our blessings. But did you ever stop to think that the opposite is also true? Thanking can help us with thinking?

For quite a few years now, scholars from around the world have studied the benefits of gratitude. One of the leading researchers in this field is Dr. Robert Emmons from the University of California, Davis. He wrote an article in 2010 titled "Why Gratitude is Good" and some of the benefits identified by his research included the following for those who practiced expressing gratitude regularly:

- 1. Physical (stronger immune systems, less bothered by aches and pains, lower blood pressure, increased exercise, better care of health, sleep longer and feel more refreshed upon waking)
- 2. Psychological (higher levels of positive emotions, more alert/alive/awake, more joy and pleasure, more optimism and happiness)
- 3. Social (more helpful, generous, compassionate, forgiving, outgoing, feel less lonely and isolat-

One would think those benefits ought to be enough to motivate us to be thankful, but there is an added bonus because gratitude might actually strengthen our brains. A study in 2022 found that higher levels of gratitude were positively associated with cognitive function among older adults.

As we read in Psalm 107:15, "Let them thank the Lord for his steadfast love, for his wonderful works to humankind." Our gratitude is a fitting response to who God is—a God of steadfast love—and what God has done—wonderful works. Yet as we focus on God and express our thanks in prayer, we receive even more grace. Our brains are strengthened, as our thanks help us think!

We have come to that time of year when we are working to fill a slate of officers for our church. For several years, our Vice-Moderator position has been empty. For well over a year, our



Mustard Seed

The opening article of this month's Link discussed the benefits of being thankful. With that in mind, here are four ways to practice gratitude as suggested by pastor and author Traci Smith. Hope you find one of them motivating enough to actually use!

Book Club - November


ORPHANED AT 12

The book chosen for November is based upon a scandal involving the Tennessee Children's Home Orphan Society. This so-called orphanage was run by a woman named Georgia Tann,. The charity was basically engaged in a type of human trafficking only the humans were children. It was able to engage in its criminal enterprise for over twenty years, from the thirties to at least 1950. Without the cooperation of authorities, including elected officials and the police, it could not have operated for so long. Children, including infants, were essentially kidnapped, lied to about their actual parents, and then sold to wealthy individuals. A significant number died or disappeared. The center of this

"enterprise" was in Memphis.

Before We Were Yours, by Lisa Wingate is constructed as a semi mystery. Since the flyleaf of the book tells us essentially what I recounted in the previous paragraph, we know the basics of the story we are going to read. Wingate's story revolves around five children who live with their parents Queenie and Briny on the Mississippi riverboat. When Queenie experiences severe trauma in the process of delivering twins while anchored on the river, she is rowed across the river to Memphis to deliver. While the parents are gone, police come and lie to the five children, Rill, Lark, Camellia, Fern, and Gabion. They range in age from 12, Rill, to about 2 or so Gabion. They are taken to the aforementioned "home" and never told what has happened to their parents.

Now Wingate shapes the novel by using a device which has become a popular structure for this type of novel. She alternates her chapters using two primary characters and two time periods. the present (the book was published in 2017) and the past, 1939. Avery Stafford, an attorney, narrates the present day chapters. She meets an elderly woman, May Crandall in a nursing home. Avery is also the daughter of a Senator from South Carolina. May approaches her, and after a brief encounter, seems to mistake Avery for someone else. Avery's long, curly, blond hair seem to be the trigger. May mentions a Fern, and Arcadia. Avery is also told that May was found in a small house near the river with her dead sister. May also in-



sists that there is some connection between herself and Avery's grandmother, Judy Stafford. Avery feels compelled to investigate the connection and find out more about May.

The alternate chapters are narrated by Rill Foss. Rill is 12 in 1939 when she, along with her siblings, are abducted by the police, and brought to a house which is part of the illegal orphanage scheme being run by Tann. Rill recounts her experiences over the course of the alternate chapters. All of the children at the home are aware of the dangerous presence of a Mr. Riggs, the caretaker, of the property. He clearly abuses the children by offering them peppermints and luring them to his room. The attending women, including Tann, certainly know of his behavior, but tolerate it. The engage in their own types of abuse.

Wingate lets us know quite early in the novel that May Stafford is indeed Rill Foss. Avery feels the need to discover May's past, but also she is compelled to find out what connection exists between May/Rill and her grandmother, Judy. A photo which includes May and Judy is one of the key elements of this puzzle.

Various subplots are introduced. Avery is engaged to Elliott; she becomes attracted to another during the course of the investigation, Trent Turner. Avery's senator father's reputation is being sullied by a nursing home scandal.

So, the plots and alternating storylines gradually merge. The truth about the Orphan Society and the years of abuse; the many mysterious disappearances which occurred from the enterprise, including the likely death of Camellia, Rill/May's sister. all need to be exposed.

Church Council Meeting Minutes
Via Zoom
October 15th, 2024 at 7:00 P.M.

The meeting was **called to order** at 7:07pm by Moderator, Bobbi Rader. Others present included Sara Gould, Tina Kruger, Ray Knutson, Tom Stepp, Cindy Waller, and Barb Townsend. Dorothy Bever, Patti Phillips, and Sally Schleiger were not able to attend.

Ray Knutson led the meeting with an opening prayer.

Additions to the agenda: Ray Knutson requested personnel recommendations be added to the agenda.

Minutes: Ray Knutson made a motion to accept the minutes from the previous September 17, 2024 Council meeting as presented, seconded by Bobbi Rader. The motion carried unanimously.

Treasurer's Report: Sara Gould made a motion to accept the report as presented, seconded by Ray Knutson. Motion carried unanimously.

Pastor's Moment (Office Moment): Cindy Waller informed the group that the church office has been busy with the upcoming pie sale for Oktoberfest and the start of the stewardship campaign. She is also anticipating end-of-year reports that will be due in about a month. She reminded Council that All Saints Day falls mid-week this year, giving us the option to mark the day on either October 27 or November 3. After discussion, a PowerPoint/movie will be created for presentation on November 3, 2024.

Ministry Leaders' Reports/Updates: Reports were available from Faith Formation and Women's Fellowship.

OLD BUSINESS

Search Committee/Update: Barb Townsend reported that the Search Committee continues the search, but has only received one applicant in the last month. The committee has also discussed the possibilities of considering a part-time position, as this would be better suited to our budget realities. This will be presented to the congregation at a later date.

Pulpit/Bridge Minister: Pastor Kathleen has requested to be gone on November 17, 2024. Council has approved this request and a pulpit supply pastor is already being sought.

Memorial Funds: There were no updates on this but Barb Townsend requested permission to spend some of the money to purchase silk plants for the back wall of the sanctuary. The current peace lilies need to be replaced as they have been there for quite some time and are showing their age. This would also help to cover the pipes in the northwest corner behind the altar. Council approved the idea.

Insurance Refund: The insurance refund promised by Acuity has not yet been received. Tom will check into this.

Stewardship: Ray Knutson reported that the stewardship campaign is underway with Commitment Sunday planned for November 10, 2024. His team will host a potluck meal following services on that day. It is hoped we have a great turnout.

Nominating Team: Bobbi Rader reported that Jennifer Neis and Diane Riese would be joining her on the nominating team. She informed the group that Patti Phillips would be leaving her position as Financial Secretary. When asked how current Council members felt about serving another term in their positions, Sara Gould stated she would need to step away. Barb Townsend would continue but no one else commented.

NEW BUSINESS

Hurricane Help—Monetary: Cindy Waller shared a letter from WI Conference UCC asking for donations to assist those affected by the recent hurricanes. Congregations who raise \$250 or more may apply for a matching grant from UCC Global H.O.P.E. Pastor Kathleen has volunteered to write this grant. After discussion, we will let our membership know about this giving opportunity to help those in need. A collection bucket will be passed during services but members will have the opportunity to drop off donations or contribute via PayPal. Bobbi will get a bucket for us to use. Barb Townsend made a motion that, in the case we do not raise \$250, budget mission money will be used to make up the difference. This was seconded by Bobbi Rader and passed unanimously.

Finance Team/Budget: Ray Knutson and Tina Kruger met to work on our budget. They presented two possible budgets—one that shows our current situation with a bridge pastor and one that shows the budget needed with a fulltime pastor. After discussion, a third budget will be created to reflect the needs of our church budget should we find and hire a part-time pastor. This is becoming more of a reality for us and this fact will be shared with the congregation at both the upcoming potluck on November 10, 2024 as well as at our annual meeting on December 1, 2024. Jennifer Neis and the search committee are considering this as a reality as well, and Jennifer is in contact with the conference to determine what this might look like.

Annual Reports—Due: After discussion, annual reports from ministry team leaders will be due to the office by November 13, 2024. Leaders are encouraged to get them in even earlier due to time constraints and the need to have the reports ready for the upcoming annual meeting.

Annual Meeting—December 1: The annual meeting will be December 1, 2024. We will discuss the possibilities of changing to a part-time pastor search at the meeting, but also hope to approve a full slate of officers, a budget for 2025, and constitutional change that reflects the structure we are currently working with—one that was approved in theory at the annual meeting last year but never completed with needed wording changes in the constitution. Barb Townsend is working on this.

Other—Personnel Recommendations: Ray Knutson explained the recommendations for office manager and worship musician suggested by the personnel team (Diane Riese and Stacy Whiteman). After discussion, Worship Musician job description will be changed from "up to 3 hymnals" to "up to 3 hymns". In addition, the third Sunday of the month will be listed as a day "off" for Denise. He added that payment for substitute musician would be raised to \$100 per service starting in January of 2025. Ray Knutson moved to accept the recommendations. Seconded by Tom Stepp and passed unanimously.

Closing Prayer: Bobbi Rader led us in a closing prayer.

Adjournment: Ray Knutson moved to adjourn, seconded by Bobbi Rader. Adjourned at 8:15pm.



Mental health is a Universal Human right!


This year's Neighbors in Need theme "Mental Health Justice for All: Mental Health is a Universal Human Right" highlights our God-given

There will be special offering envelopes available on Sunday in your bulletin as well as insers with more information about Neighbors in Need.



You might want to try Sacred Self-Care: Daily Practices for Nurturing Our Whole Selves by Dr. Chanequa Walker-Barnes.





Book Club - October BAD

What constitutes acceptable interactions between men and women in our "modern" society? This question centers the novel read for October. In The Whisper Network by Chandler Baker the reader must think hard about this question. The title refers to the interactions which take place in the

fictional company of "Truviv". Four female corporate attorneys participate in gossipy type discussions about the behavior of their male colleagues, particularly the head of their division, Ames Garrett. A result of their discussions is a document, which is clandestinely distributed among female employees, called the BAD spreadsheet.

A male, whose name gets included in the document, is labeled as being something of a person to "watch out for". Female attorneys, Sloane, Ardie, and Grace are veteran corporate lawyers; they have welcomed a new employee, Katherine into their company. She is somewhat younger, and comes from a background where she was, in her telling, wrongly blamed for some incidents at her old employer and fired. She comes from Boston, and is now working in Dallas with the other women. The company, Truviv, seems to be modeled on companies like Nike, Adidas, and other sports ap-

parel businesses. Competition underlays the entire


structure of the novel.

Sloan has had a brief affair with Ames years ago, before she was engaged and married to her husband, Derek. Clearly, Sloan has continuing animosity toward Ames. The three veterans warn Katherine about Ames. Through Rosalita, a woman who cleans the offices at night, we see that Katherine is engaged in some way with Ames in his office one night after hours. Sloan eventually insists that Ames be included in the BAD list. Since Ames is also the most likely candidate to become the CEO of the company, Sloan then enlists the others, except Katherine, to file a harassment complaint against both Ames and the Company.

It is here that the novel ventures into more mysterious territory. Ames falls or was pushed from the 18th floor balcony to his death. All indications are that Ames has taken his own life. All of the ramifications of Ames behavior as well as the behavior Sloan, Ardie, and

Grace, now come colliding together.

Chandler Baker works as a corporate attorney. Clearly, the novel is based upon her experiences in the competitive atmosphere of the/this world. Many of the chapters begin strangely with a third person narrator, who may or may not be one of the novel's characters commenting about the experiences of the women who work in this environment. This unnamed voice introduces some chapters and is meant to underscore the experience of functioning in this corporate environment.



For example, Chapter 17 begins, "Inescapable lo-grade thought spirals that manifested in the at -least-once-a -week clammy feeling that spread out in our guts while we rode the elevator down to the lobby, the slow sense of dread building, that we'd left something undone, mishandled a situation, or "..." up royally."

Baker continually highlights the wealth and privilege which the women, and men, enjoy. She makes it clear through the exclusive brand name dropping which she does that they enjoy a valued lifestyle. They are not portrayed as "poor, little, rich girls" however. The fact that, on every level, their lives are dominated by competition, both spoken and unspoken, and that that competitiveness drives the relationships which they have with their male counterparts shows that not just simple sexism is at work

The novel presents many interesting, and challenging ideas which should lead to a spirited and interesting discussion when we meet.

Rummage Sale: A Look Back and a Look Ahead

For years we had been known as the church with the rummage sale, but it has been quite some time since we have hosted this huge event. While there is talk of the sale returning (next summer during the Elkhorn City-Wide Rummage Sale on June 6th and 7th) some changes should perhaps be made. First, however, we need to take a look back to understand how it might look in the future.

<u>A Look Back</u> Our rummage sale was always held on the weekend of Elkhorn's Corn and Brat Days in August. Members would bring boxes of unwanted items to church starting in the early days of May and continuing through the days of the sale itself. In addition, it was not unusual for us to accept the "leftovers" from other rummage sales. Several dedicated women of the church would meet weekly all summer to sort through the rummage—pricing, organizing, and even throwing some of it away as it was not suitable for sale.

Awnings were put up in the church yard on the Thursday night before the sale and tables were hauled up from Fellowship Hall to be ready for the two-day event. Bright and early on Friday morning, a huge team was needed to move the numerous boxes from all corners of the Christian Education building rooms and hallways so the sale items could be spread out on the tables for shoppers to view. In addition, all the furniture that had accumulated for the sale was brought out for display on Geneva Street.

Why It Was Abandoned While the rummage sale was always profitable for us, we had to end it due to the extreme amount of work that was falling on the congregation, several of whom dedicated a morning a week during summer months to get ready for the sale. In addition, it seemed harder to get workers—especially for all the heavy lifting and carrying that was required on the days of the sale. Packing up was also a task—several trucks and trailers were required to haul away items that did not sell.

<u>A Look Ahead</u> The Women's Fellowship meeting in September had some good discussion on the topic of bringing back the sale. Considering the reasons the sale was finally abandoned; these are the changes we feel might make a difference:

- Anyone bringing in items will have to bring them in the week of the sale. No early boxes will be accepted. We are asking that these items be clean and suitable for resale—nothing stained, chipped, or broken. The items should be things you would consider purchasing if you were in the market for any given item—not just the junk you want to get rid of. Further, each person will be responsible for unpacking their items for display on tables in Fellowship Hall. You will also be encouraged to come to help with the pack-up of items remaining—and hopefully several of you will agree to pass the items on to other charities.
- Nothing will be priced. Customers will be asked to judge what they wish to donate for the items they purchase. We will accept whatever is offered and for a family in need, these items may make a huge difference.
- Large items will be discouraged unless you are able to provide the manpower to move the item in yourself AND move it out again if it does not sell.
- We will not accept the unsold items from other sales. There is a reason the items are still there and we don't want them, either!
- We need to have some discussion as to the inclusion of clothing, linens, towels, etc. in our sale. As mentioned previously, these may be the items greatly needed by some families, but anything brought in will NEED to be clean and not be in need of repair.

Share Your Thoughts Women's Fellowship asks that you share your thoughts about this idea for next year. In addition, please consider the following questions: Might you be willing to assist us the week before when people bring things in? (Someone would have to be here at various times that week so people can bring things in and set them on tables.) Would you be able to work the day of the sale? (We will need people to help with the sale on Friday and Saturday.) Please share your thoughts with someone from Women's Fellowship. We want your input!



Spiritual Practices to Reduce Back-to-School Anxiety* *(or any type of anxiety you may be feeling!)

Thoughts of "back to school" always come up at this time of the year. Knowing our congregation has been involved in the WISE community (learning about mental health concerns and resources that might be available), September can also bring some feelings of anxiety. Recently, I found an article about this and it suggested the following practices to reduce any anxiety that people may be experiencing. While not many of you reading this are of school age, the practices are solid and useable in any situation

that brings about anxiety.

1. Naming Gratitude Promoting the habit of naming things for which we are grateful is a wonderful practice! Choosing a set time to share these conversations either daily or weekly will help to put emphasis on the positive things in our world. That will help to diminish stress we may otherwise feel in our day-to-day lives.



2. Classroom Supply Donation Involving ourselves in an act of service such as this can help us change the focus of our own anxieties to the needs of others. Acts of kindness allow us to reflect on God's love in the world. Helping children learn about and practice this means of grace will obviously help others, but it will teach our youth to develop a sense of purpose and generosity so greatly needed in our society.

3. Breath Prayers Breath prayers are short prayers that are accomplished in one breath in and

out. They bid not only a sense of calmness to come over us, but also the presence of God in a moment of anxiety. They come in handy when we feel nervous and can help to bring a peaceful feeling to us. The article suggested trying these simple breath prayers but look elsewhere in this edition of The Link for additional breath prayers you might find helpful:



- **4. Practice Sabbath** Set aside a day (or a few hours each week) as an intentional family time (or rest time) as this helps to foster a sense of balance and well-being. Planning walks or other activities allowing you to enjoy each other's company is a healthy practice.
- **5. Listen with Intent** Become an active listener while members of your family tell you about the highs and lows of the day. This simple practice will allow family members to feel valued. It will also help to make stronger connections and provide emotional support. This will encourage more open communication as it helps family members to feel heard and understood.

These five spiritual practices will help you and your family by encouraging a home that is peaceful and connected. The focus they provide will help family members to concentrate on gratitude, service, prayer, rest, and active (intentional) listening—all of which are tools that can be used to help reduce the stress and anxiety that may exist. They will also help to deepen your family's spiritual journey as you connect with each other.

In 2017, our church was given the opportunity to drive the golf cart taxis on Monday (Labor Day), at the Walworth County Fair and we have continued this tradition


for the following years. (only missing 2020 because of Covid).

Book Club - September

ARCHETYPES

In a novel which I am now reading there is a line which applies directly to the novel chosen for September. The line is,"...the use of archetypes...a limited number of stories are available to us and it is up to us to make something original out of the components we've been given..." The novel chosen for September is The Last Thing He Told Me, Laura Dave. Ms. Dave makes use of a familiar archetype in constructing the plot of her novel. The unexpected and mysterious disappearance of a spouse, friend or some other person close to the protagonist should be quite familiar to anyone who reads (or even watches movies).

Here we have a story which begins with the protagonist, Hannah Hall, whose husband Owen suddenly disappears. The book's title refers to a cryptic note which he, Owen Michaels, has left for


her. It reads only, "Protect her". It becomes quickly clear that the message refers to Bailey, Owen's sixteen -year-old daughter with his first wife, who passed away in an auto accident.

So, the plot is built around the questions which this poses. Why has Owen disappeared, why does Bailey need protecting, and consequently, how is Hannah supposed to protect her, and where is Owen? Protect Bailey from who or what?

Owen's disappearance seems certainly to be connected to the Federal investigation into the company which Owen works for. It's CEO is being accused of essentially operating a Ponzi scheme which has defrauded investors millions of dollars. Since Owen is essentially second in control of the company, it makes sense that he is likely a target of the Federal probe himself. Two important questions stand out. The CEO didn't flee, why did Owen. Bailey is theoretically not involved at all, so why the message?


Ms. Dave employs another, if we are honest, overused subplot. The antagonism of the step-daughter toward her stepmother. Bailey is portrayed as the typical sullen, rebellious teenager, who is especially resentful of her relatively new mom. Honestly, while it is a fact that conflict is the root of plot, this overused trope doesn't really add anything important to the novel.

That said, the novel proceeds as a quest to discover the truth behind the disappearance of Ow-



So, it is generally not a wise idea to delve into the plots of novels like this because the whole point is for the author to create twists and turns so that the archetypal framework stays fresh for the reader. Too much information by someone like me is not a good way to get people to want to read it.


